<sup>3</sup> For demonstration projects listed in the legislation, applications must be submitted no later than September 1, 2009. For other applications, DOR will begin accepting them on September 1, 2009 and will stop accepting them when the statewide aggregate limit is fully allocated.

<sup>4</sup> DOR has indicated that the intent was to permit local taxing districts to utilize a property tax only version without requiring State approval through the formal process required for . However, the key term “revitalization area” is defined to include the concept of DOR approval of a revitalization area, though it does not specify how this “approval” may be obtained. DOR has indicated that it will likely provide some alternative approval letter for these types of projects, but has not yet determined how that will work. There is no limit on the number that may be approved and it should not be a competitive process.
